1. Native Land and Family Home

Teresa's impact unfolded in a century marked by religious strife and a great schism in the church.

When she was born in 1515, a mere twenty years had passed since the Moors had been driven out and Spain united in the Catholic faith.

- Avila (Avila of the Saints) was her native town;
- Her parents, Alonso Sanchez de Cepeda, pious and virtuous; Beatrice de Ahumada, mild and humble, were of old nobility;
- Teresa was the sixth child of her father and the third of her mother;
- Six younger siblings were later added to five older ones.

2. Childhood and Youth

"We were reading the lives of the saints together. When I saw what torments the martyrs endured for God, I discovered the they had earned the joy of seeing God for a low price, and I burned with the desire to die a similar death" (L,1,1) We decided to travel to the land of the Moors to get our heads cut off.

- 'Forever!...We must become martyrs."
- They did not get far...an uncle took the fugitives back to their parents;
- She built hermitages ... and played monastery life...and continued lengthy devotions;
- The early death of her mother drove Teresa to the Mother of God; and began to devour romances of chivalry;

2. Childhood and Youth

There came a time when I understood the natural gifts that heaven had bestowed on me...

Soon I acquired a taste for beautiful clothes...
I took many pains with my hands and my hair... (L, 1,8; 2,2)

- Teresa had blossomed into a young beauty... the young beauty did not lack admirers;
- The influence of one young relative was particularly unhealthy;
- This friendship changed me so much that there was nothing left of my good nature (L, 2, 4);
- The transformation alarmed her father and sister...they made a decision;
- Don Alonso sent his darling to an Augustinian monastery to be educated.

3. The Monastery Pupil

With grateful love she attached herself to the Boarding School Directress,
Maria Bricerio, a devout nun & outstanding educator.

"She spoke beautifully of God!
I loved to listen to her. She told how,
upon reading the words of the Gospel,
"many are called but few are chosen,"
she made the decision to
leave the world...
I felt the thought, the longing for
eternal things awakening in me..."

- The Monastery of Our Lady of Grace was highly regarded in Avila;
- Teresa remained 1 ½ years in the monastery school;
- Toward the end of her stay she was inclined to religious life;
- She had a dear friend at the Incarnation she wanted to be with;
- She was thinking more of her nature and less of the salvation of her soul.

4. Vocational Decision

Her uncle's life was devoted to prayer & spiritual books. He asked Teresa to read to him. The *Letters* of St. Gerome, St. Gregory's Morals, & St. Augustine's writings captivated her spirit & reawakened the pious enthusiasm of her childhood.

- Teresa returned to her Father's house; she became ill;
- Returning from convalescence at her sister's, she stayed a few weeks with her uncle Pedro Sanchez de Cepeda; this visit was decisive for Teresa;
- Eternal salvation became her goal, to not lose sight of it, she conquered her aversion to religious life, her love for freedom, & her family attachment;
- Since she cannot hope for her father's consent, she secretly leaves home;
- Teresa entered the Incarnation monastery on All Souls day 1535.
